
Why Join a SIG?

2018 WORKSHOPS



Glowing Gradients: Luminous Color in Yarn and Cloth

With Carol Soderlund An artist and educator for 25 years, Carol's curiosity about the range of color derived from yellow, red, and blue dyes led to her creation of her Color Mixing system for dyers. Carol encourages the freedom of mixing color by eye with results-based samples to guide the student.

A former high school teacher, Carol was nominated for Teacher of the Year in 2013 and again in 2015 by the International Association of Creative Arts Professionals.

Carol is co-author of Playful Fabric Printing with Melanie Testa. She has shown her quilts in juried venues across the country, winning awards including Best of Show at the International Quilt Festival in Houston, Texas.

In this two-day workshop presented by WRSW, you'll learn the basics and beyond of creating color with Procion MX fiber reactive dyes on fibers such as cotton, tencel, rayon, linen, and silk. Sampling on cotton cloth, we'll mix a rainbow of hues from three primary colors, ultimaly building a note-book of colors and formulations, opening up a world of possibilities and expanding your color confidence and palette. The next day we'll apply these hues to yarn, warps, or yardage in beautiful multi-color blends. These projects will be ultimately washed out at home following class.
