
GUILD LIBRARY IS OPEN

DYEING

The Dyeing SIG met via Zoom on Saturday, February 13th. The topic was snow/ice dyeing and due to the abundance of snow, everyone who shared their projects used snow.

Linda Christopher dyed 3 cuts of fabric. One was silk and the other two were cotton batiste. She used pure and complex dyes and let it sit in her garage for 24 hours so the snow would melt slowly. She plans to make woven summer tops.

JoEllen dyed 3 skeins of 8/2 tencel She also put it in the garage to melt the snow. The snow was a bit icy. It snowed more the next day and she dyed a cut of fabric with a white background and a blue design on it. The snow was powdery and melted quickly.



Bob dyed 12/2 linen in a natural color. Bob washed the linen and used soda ash then froze the yarn. He let it thaw and while the yarn was damp proceeded with snow dyeing.

Mo dyed 4 onesies and 2 toddler tee shirts using Rit powder dye. After the snow melted, the garments were heated in a solution of water and Rit Color Fixative for 20 minutes and then rinsed. These will be gifts.





Bob showed his gradient dyed threads to make a Rosepath network twill. The colors ranged from grays to acquis. He used Fiberworks weaving design software for designing his project.

Bob also showed us a hat from fabric he had woven some time ago. It turned out great and looked good on him.

Our next meeting will be on March 27th to discuss workshops and an invitation to demonstrate natural dyeing at the 2nd Annual Honey Bee Festival on September 18, 2021.

The April 10th meeting at Praxis was canceled.

SPIN SIG - monthly report - March 2021

The book focuses on different ways to manipulate dyed top to achieve various colored yarns. Some of the topics covered were:

The influence of color spacing
Different ways to spin 2-ply, 3-ply and 4-ply yarns
Spinning a Fractal yarn
Spinning colored top with a solid color
Various Marled yarns
Various Cabled yarns

Member Flora Daniels shared a recent Fractal spin that she had completed, showing the steps she used throughout the spin.
