Reimbursement Award for Active Membership (RAAM) Jointly presented by the 2022 RAAM Committee

Symbiosis: Interaction between two different organisms living in close physical association, typically to the advantage of both. A mutually beneficial relationship between different people or groups.

You wouldn't think to use the word symbiosis when you think about WRSW, but we actually have a specific program that relies on this action in order to nourish our guild to be potentially vibrant and diverse. We're talking about our RAAM (Reimbursement Award for Active Membership) program! The basis of this award is to offer active guild members an opportunity to study in their area of fiber interest. Some may choose to use their award in a 1 or 2 day single point of instruction class or guild workshop, others have opted to take a weeklong single point of instruction at schools around the country. The RAAM program encourages education!

Who is eligible for a RAAM award? Every member in the guild... once they've accumulated 70 activity points. You see, groups like WRSW are volunteer-driven – it depends on people like us to give their time and talents to help the guild function. How fast or slow you accumulate your points is up to you – and of course this program is completely voluntary. The complete program prospectus is available to read on the Members page at <u>www.wrspinweave.org</u>. By being an active member of the guild, you are both strengthening the guild AND you get closer to achieving a Reimbursement Award towards a desired class. Points are tallied throughout the year, and the RAAM Committee sends an email to each member at the start of the new year.

The symbiotic relationship between giving and receiving is evident in so many ways in our guild. We hope that this brief article reminds you of the importance of the RAAM program in being a major way in which together we can help each other and our community to "teach and promote the arts of spinning, weaving, dyeing and related fiber arts."




